
sacred music compositions, he publishes his work through World Library Publications.

FREDERIK MEIJER GARDENS AND SCULPTURE PARK AWAITS YOUR ARRIVAL IN GRAND RAPIDS, MICHIGAN!!

DIA members attending Gathering 2010 in Grand Rapids will spend a breathtaking afternoon at Frederik Meijer Gardens & Sculpture Park with the added attraction of Dale Chihuly's exhibit. Some call it a "glass act" but Chihuly, a most celebrated glass artist, simply calls it "A New Eden". Michigan's premier outdoor sculpture venue plays host to fifteen hand-blown glass sculptures, made up of over 5,000 individual multi-hued pieces of color.



Grand Rapids art appreciators are ecstatic over Chihuly's second show coming to the area. He seems doubly pleased to return, "I'm happy to be coming back to Frederik Meijer Gardens. The outdoor show will enable me to exhibit my artwork in some unique and beautiful locations throughout this magnificent garden and sculpture park. It's an honor to exhibit with so many great artists. I think the park is fabulous."

Viewers will be entranced with color-filled, light-enhanced Chandeliers, glass Towers, floating Spheres, Reeds rising from the earth, the Sun, the Moon and a rowboat full of glass. These works will catch the eye both indoors and outside. The Gardens also owns a Chandelier and cacophony of colorful flower-like shapes that adorn the ceiling of the dining area.

Joseph Betcherer, Meijer Gardens' chief curator and vice president, is quoted in the May edition of On-The-Town magazine, "This exhibition celebrates one of the world's foremost glass artists and his much-anticipated return to Meijer Gardens, Specifically created for this exhibition, Chihuly's sculptural glass infuses his expression of nature with the stunning landscape of our grounds."

Steve LaWarre, director of horticulture at the Gardens adds, "Horticulture and sculpture are fully unified in this exhibition. The landscaping incorporates our natural terrain in addition to the large-scale expression of bold colors, textures and patterns complimentary to Chihuly's work." The exhibit will provide an artistic ambrosia that will invite the artistic soul to simply soar. PS: Bring your camera.

FEATURE: The Artist as Preacher

Mosaic Side Altar

This is my <u>second</u> reflection on Adele Myers OP latest work which graces Our Lady of the Sacred Heart Church in Old Tappan, New York. My first attempt flowed (pun intended) from two assumptions: 1) that the church and the artist were located overlooking the Hudson River

and 2) that the artist intended to preach an ecotheological homily in mosaic

Fortunately before getting very far with my narrow pre-fabricated sermon, I consulted Adele! "In creating the design, there was no intent to preach about the

environment — although that is of utmost interest to me." Adele chose water, she explained, as the "cleansing, grace-filled sacramental" through which Our Lady of Lourdes brought physical and spiritual healing to thousands.

When I got out of the way and let the water speak for me, it became a silent prayer to the Mother of the Word Incarnate to heal the theological wounds which fester into doubt, arrogant triumphalism, or a terrible fear of all religion.

Then the image of the clean, refreshing water surrounding the conventional statue of Mary became my prayer to the Queen of Peace for reconciliation at all levels of our violent world. When I let the water wash away all my

assumptions, and speak to me, it fulfills Adele's primary desire: "Just to create a pleasing, meaningful design."

"Beauty is truth, truth beauty." When we let art be itself, there is no need for preaching.

- Gathering Update Page -

NOTE NEW TRAVEL DIRECTIONS:

Expressway 196 that travels East and West through the heart of Grand Rapids is now closed! Three of our original directions have to be changed, sooooooo –

Coming from South: Take 131 to Exit 84B on your right towards 131 Business Route – Downtown. Drive ½ mi. and make a right onto Oakes St. Make a left onto Division Ave. Make a right onto Fulton Street. Drive 2.5 miles to Marywood. Pass the Motherhouse on your left and turn left at Lakeside Drive following the signs to Aquinata Hall.

Coming from the North: Take 131 south to Gerald R Ford 196 West toward Holland. Stay in right lane and exit at Lane Street (it's the first exit). Make a left onto Lane and continue to Bridge Street. Make a left turn onto Bridge Street and continue over the Grand River (where Bridge St. turns into Michigan St.) pass "Medical Mile" hospital sites continuing east for about 2 miles to Lakeside Drive. On block beyond the light at Plymouth Ave., take a right onto Lakeside Drive and follow the signs to Aquinata Hall at Marywood.

Coming from the West: 196 east to Lane Street exit 76 on the right. Take a right onto Lane Street. Make a left turn onto Bridge Street and continue over the Grand River (where Bridge St. turns into Michigan St.), pass "Medical Mile" hospital sites continuing east for about 2.5 miles to Lakeside Drive. Make a right onto Lakeside Drive and follow the signs to Aquinata Hall at Marywood.

Coming from the East: Follow original directions written in the registration packet.

Ways to Save on Transportation

For lower costs check out flying into Detroit or Chicago hubs and renting a car to drive to Grand Rapids. Detroit and Chicago are about 3hrs away from GR. Other cost cutting ideas might be to fly into Lansing or Kalamazoo which are about 40 mins. to an hour away from GR and rent a car.

Travel by Train or Bus: Grand Rapids has an AMTRAK depot and a bus station about 3 miles from Marywood. We'll pick you up too! Taking a train or bus can be leisurely and offer time for reflection and rest.

WISE WORDS FROM THE ARTISTS

Taken from <u>Theology and the Arts: Encountering God through Music</u> <u>and Rhetoric</u> by Richard Viladesau

Beauty, the capacity to produce joy through perception – demands conversion.

For many people in an unreligious age, good art ... perhaps, provides a stirring image of pure transcendence.

God is what we anticipate and implicitly know in all experiences of form, order, loveliness and desirability. Receptivity to beauty is a condition of human openness to divine revelation.

However crucial the verbal dimension of celebration ... there is also need for a rich symbolic communication to bring people emotionally and intellectually into a mystery in which words are inadequate.
