Stage Presence, A Spirituality of Theater, an article by Rob Weinert-Kendt in the May 2-9, 2011 America caught my eye. He writes, "Theater is an arena where narrative is incarnated. When a story is made flesh before us on stage, by actual people with whom we share breathing space, it is no longer just information, mere plot points. It is metaphor with the sweat and spit of life in it, and that makes all the difference."

The six of us living at 719 Penn in Atlanta usher at the Alliance Theater as a service and as an opportunity to take in performances. The most recent play was *August: Osage County*. The lead, Brenda Bynum, came out of retirement just to play the part of Violet Weston.

The play was intense. I recall a particular moment when I experienced the entire audience of 650 in a trance with no one breathing. I broke from it. Sitting in the available wheel chair section I was able to survey the whole audience, gripped and focused. It was a powerful shared moment of profound silence and connection. Words became flesh.



Constance Klamroth OP holds a Bachelor's Degree in Music, with a major in Church Music, from Redlands School of Music in CA and a Master of Arts in Education from the University of San Diego. She has taught classroom music and has directed both children and adult choirs serving as Minister of Music in several parishes in Illinois. Constance has been the Pianist/Liturgist at the Motherhouses of the Springfield, IL and the Akron, OH Dominican Sisters. Currently, Sister is semi-retired and continues to serve as one of the Liturgists at the Springfield Dominican Motherhouse.



Marjorie Delaplane OP, formerly on the piano faculty at South Suburban College, teaches piano and harpsichord privately, at the Sherwood Conservatory of Music and in her private studio at Regina Dominican High School. She received her Bachelor of Music degree from Siena Heights College in Adrian, MI and her Master of Music degree from the University of Michigan. She pursued a doctorate at Indiana University School of Music where she was an Associate Instructor of piano. There she studied piano under the international concert pianist, Jorge Bolet and minored in harpsichord under Marie Zorn, a student of Wanda Landowska, the artist responsible for the revival of the harpsichord in this century. Marjorie also holds a piano certificate from the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria where she studied with Heinz Scholz.

She has played with orchestras and in recitals throughout the Midwest.



Magdalena Ezoe OP, a native of Tokyo, Japan, is an Associate Professor Emeritus of Music at Siena Heights University, Adrian, Michigan. A graduate of Siena Heights, she holds a Master of Music degree from the University of Michigan in piano. As a member of the Dominican Sisters of Adrian, Magdalena has been composing many musical settings for the liturgy since 1970. The complete Mass setting for St. Catherine of Siena and one for All Saints, as well as several Psalm settings, hymns and keyboard solos have been published by the Alliance Publications, Inc. Sinsinawa, WI. One of Magdalena's favorite musical activities is to present lecture-recitals on music performance, aesthetics and appreciation. In 1991 Magdalena visited Poland, the native land of composer Fryderyk Chopin. He has been her favorite piano composer since her childhood.



Melissa Blankestyn OP holds a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education from the University of Illinois and a Masters in Music Education from VanderCook College of Music in Chicago. Prior to joining the Dominican Sisters of Springfield in 2006, Melissa was the orchestra director and assistant band director at Bradley-Bourbonnais Community High School in

Bradley, IL. She also taught junior high school band in Steger, IL and several of her students have gone on to pursue music. Joining the faculty at Marian Catholic High School in Chicago Heights in 2009, Melissa assists with the band, teaches Freshman Theology classes and mentors Dominican Preachers, a group of seniors who attend the Dominican High Schools' Preaching Conference and are involved in the many faith aspects of life. Melissa has played clarinet for 25 years, performing with the Kankakee Symphony Orchestra and the Kankakee Valley Theater. She has also played regularly in the parishes of which she has been a part. For the DIA 2011 Gathering, she will be playing a duet with Constance Klamroth OP.



Soprano, Anita Smisek OP, enjoys using her gift of music as a singer nurtured by a singing mother. She grew up hearing her mother's beautiful voice for 60 years and studied piano for 12 years. Becoming an organist and choir director were just part of the preparation for becoming a church musician. Singing in parts was nurtured from the time she was a little one — in second grade she was singing a good second part to her sister's soprano. The Smisek Sisters Trio was a fun family experience until she entered the convent. In adulthood, she began to take voice lessons to better understand how to teach others and to model a good use of her vocal abilities. She has enjoyed growing into her voice over the years and using it to present programs of Czech classical and folksong, Sacred Solo Programs and for being a soloist at Church weddings, funerals and anniversary celebrations. Anita holds a Masters Degree in Music History and Liturgy from the University of Minnesota. She currently publishes the music of over 250

composers through Alliance Publications, Inc. and ministers as organist/choir director for St. Patrick's Church in Benton, WI.



Michael Burke OP, familiar to DIA regulars for his gentle piano background accompaniment for performers at many annual Gatherings and known as the Piano-Playing Priest, is a member of the Southern Dominican Province. He has been a pianist and musician since boyhood and music is the focus of his ministry. He holds a Doctorate in Ministry in Clinical Studies and Preaching from Andover Newton Theological Seminary in Newton Center, MA. Several years ago, he began to integrate his music with his preaching and played piano meditation music after giving presentations. Over time, he has developed a very unique style of interpreting the preached word with music. For ten years, Michael hosted a TV program in the diocese of Raleigh, NC titled "Windows: Catholic Religion and Spirituality" which joined preaching and piano music to accompany scenery of nature in North Carolina.

ARTIST AS PREACHER

We use the phrase "contemplative cinema" in Mud Puddle Films' mission statement. I've been surprised to hear the word "contemplative" used by a few film critics recently. And not in a religious context.

Breath


So what is contemplative cinema? My favorite examples of this kind of cinema have a lot less dialogue than most films: **The Sweet Hereafter, Talk to Her, Red, Blue, Lost in Translation, 35 Shots of Rum.** Less dialogue, more opportunity to chew over what's going on. Certainly contemplative prayer is about letting go of words and just being with God. Mud Puddle Films' recent feature project, **Zola Jumped In,** may not have any words at all except for occasionally sung, ritual words. Lots of b r e a t h I n g r o o m.

Similarly, contemplative cinema gives us breathing room with a slower pace: less incident, less cutting from shot to shot. The video Catechism project I'm working on has been a real challenge because we're trying to balance conceptual information with visual and musical delight. And we're trying to balance the stereotypical assumption that we all like fast-paced videos with the desire to invite people into a contemplative space.

Immersion

A wonderful film from this year is **Meek's Cutoff**, about a small group of lost Oregon pioneers. Contemplative cinema is often designed for the big screen, even if **Meek's Cutoff** noticeably eschews the popular wide shape of the big screen and uses a 4:3 aspect ratio - i.e., the nearly square shape of very old movies and not-so-old TVs.

Contemplative films use the big screen to immerse us into an experience. This can be with wide shots that have several things going on at once, left and right, top and bottom, foreground and background. Or it can be done with close-ups that give us communion with characters such as the terrific actress Michelle Williams, the central character of **Meek's Cutoff.** The creators of this film use the big screen to immerse us in the journey of Oregon pioneers, but unlike the typical (widescreen) western, it cuts off the periphery, just like those pioneer women's bonnets, inciting our hearts to wonder about the mystery of what else is out there.

Mystery

Mystery is an important aspect of contemplative cinema. Whether we watch contemplative cinema on the big screen or large screen, it draws us in. It seduces rather than assaults. It asks questions more than gives answers. It allows us to participate. Mud Puddle Films' mission statement also expresses the desire to "open minds to mystery." **Meek's Cutoff** has plenty of quiet mystery, including an ambiguous ending that will leave you frustrated, tantalized, or both.
